As we move forward together, we remain hopeful that our academic experiences and other opportunities return to "normal" very soon. Entering our third year as a district, we have taken steps to formalize a goal-setting process and to actively receive feedback from our stakeholders. The feedback received from surveys sent by the District is often used to modify or adjust our plans and procedures. Thank you for your continued participation in providing this necessary feedback. We look forward to seeing you at our events throughout the year.

District Goals:

The formalized goal-setting process for the 2021-22 school year was a result of the feedback received from the previous two school years. We are using the OKR's (Objectives and Key Results) in an effort to write better goals and to adequately measure our progress toward those goals throughout the year. We have four major district-level goals that we are working on this year.

- Track elective offerings and participation

Streamline the COMMUNICATION at BVCSD as measured by:

- Developing a clear Communication Plan for the District inclusive of type, method, and frequency of communication
- Distribute the plan throughout the school community
- Assign personnel responsible for creating/contributing to the communication
- Assign personnel responsible for distributing the communication
- Count and evaluate the following for on-time communications:
 - Annual-Budget Notice
 - Quarterly- Newsletters
 - Monthly- BOE Meetings and BOE Meeting minutes
 - Weekly- Griffin Gazette, TWIGS, and Bulleted List
 - Daily- Attendance Calls
 - · As needed

Establish the CLIMATE AND CULTURE in the district for staff and students as measured by:

- Provide one off-campus experience per cohort of students per year.
- Provide two intentional assemblies and/or presentations for students per year
- Provide one meaningful professional development for Faculty and Staff per month as part of our long-term plan
- Host ten parent events per year with at least 25% parent attendance.

Establish OPPORTUNITIES AND EXPERIENCES for the students as measured by:

- Provide one off-campus experience per cohort of students per year.
- Provide two intentional assemblies and/or presentations for students per year
- Provide one meaningful professional development for Faculty and Staff per month as part of our long-term
- Host ten parent events per year with at least 25% parent attendance.


MOUNTAIN VIEW CAMPUS

FACILITIES UPDATE



Welcome to our new Director of Facilities, Scott Farrell. Scott will oversee the Buildings and Grounds, and Transportation departments.

Update on the New Facility:

We submitted our plan for a new facility to The New York State Education Department (NYSED) 8-9 months ago. We were expecting, as per their website, a 6-8 week period to receive a response. It has clearly taken much longer than that and your patience is sincerely appreciated. NYSED employees have reviewed parts and pieces of the plan and have emailed follow-up and clarifying questions to myself and the architect over the past three months. When information is released to the district, it will be published on the schools website

(www.boquetvalleycsd.org), and presented at a Board of Education meeting. There will be several public forums and an opportunity for community members to voice their opinions.

Based on recent estimates from the architect, and taking into account that we still have not gotten a response from NYSED, our

best case scenario for a voter referendum is likely in June of 2022. As we have seen, this could continue to be delayed. This is not confirmed, and no date has been officially set. This is simply an estimate based on the information that we have at this time. Once we have information from NYSED, we will be able to set a timeline including all the steps in the process through building completion.
